- The CIA is the national organization of the actuarial profession in Canada.
- Over 3,620 Fellows (FCIA) and 1,030 Associates (ACIA).
- The CIA Head Office is located in Ottawa with 21 staff.

Mission

- Advance actuarial science through research.
- Educate and qualify ACIA's and FCIA's.
- Ensure actuarial services provided by members meet extremely high professional standards.
- Maintain rules of professional conduct.
- Advocate for the profession with governments and the public in the development of public policy.



Research organization

- ResCo started in 2005:
 - Prior to that research was done by a variety of committees,
 - Centralized in 2005.
- ResCo has a number of sub-committees reporting to it:
 - Representing our major practice areas such as Life, Pensions,
 P&C, etc.,
 - Sub-committees usually have members representing major companies involved with that practice area:
 - e.g. Life sub-committee has reps from major life companies.



Research projects

- Projects ideas are developed by these sub-committees.
 Other ideas come from other CIA committees or individual members:
 - Individual members can submit project ideas. If approved the ResCo can fund the project.
- Also do joint projects, mainly with the SOA.
- Last year spent \$450,000 on research.
- ResCo is composed of volunteers with some support from CIA's Head Office.



Project approval

- For projects to be approved should be of value to the CIA and/or the Canadian Public.
